303 AD PROFILE 13: LONDON 1900

This issue of AD has been published in conjunction with an exhibition mounted by the Royal Institute of British Architects Drawing Collection, and features the buildings of London from the period of 1890 to 1914. The Guest Editor of this issue, Gavin Stamp, has also been responsible for the RIBA exhibition which is being held at the Heinz Gallery during June and July (the exhibition is expected to tour internationally). This period of building, which co-incided with the apogee of the British Empire, had an enormous impact on the appearance of the city. Yet it is a period of architectural production which, because of certain dogmas of the Modern Movement, is almost completely ignored by contemporary architects. This issue of AD directs attention to this rich and remarkably accessible period of British architecture.
