#### **Building Types Study:** Local government administration buildings

As we have progressed from the barebones buildings built for government after World War II, we have seen the development of a distinctive public architecture which embodies economies tempered by an increasing regard for the users' and viewers' sensibilities. Strong sculptural forms now tell us that court houses and city halls-while not the temples of the nineteenth century-are clearly something different from super-markets and gas stations. Accordingly, the August Building Types Study will show buildings that illustrate strong and appropriate characters.
