#### 125 Housing

A recent study conducted by ARCHITECTURAL RECORD showed that nearly two-thirds of the architects randomly polled had designed multifamily housing within the past two years, making the design of housing nearly as ubiquitous a professional activity as the desire for it is among the general public. The issues are universal: shelter, image, comfort, location, cost, and a host of others. Luckily, the results are by no means universally similar; there is these days no single, new trend in housing design. Perhaps this signals the beginning of a long-overdue awareness that there shouldn't, indeed can't, be one, since houses are as different as the people they house and the places where they stand.
