This handsome, functional building is an example of Platner's precisely logical approach to design-for every detail of the design from adherence to zoning constraints to the choice of plantings and art work. Intended as "a working mol the building has proven to be an image-builder for the company (which it was not programmed to be).

- The Recycling Vancouver's Granville Island A report by planners Michael and Julie Seelig on the upgrading of an industrial area off the coast of Vancouver. Markets, parks, small boat harbors, and oundoor amphitheater, crafts shops and a museum have been added in a way which respects the Island's ongoing industrial vitality and character.
- Ainsworth Gymnasium, Smith College by The Architects Collaborative, Inc. A strong circulation spine becomes the organizing principle for a collegiate athletic facility in Northhampton, Massachusetts. Built on a site adjoining an older gymnasium, the new building ties old to new and continues the school's tradition of women's sports.
- **M** Cluster housing in Hawaii Difficult site conditions, and a benign cimate, proved to be the determinants for the design of a four-unit residential complex by Zephyr Architectural Partnership.
- Radical interior changes suggest new directions for re-use Two transformations of buildings designed for completely different uses show that what once seemed infeasible may soon become the norm.
