201 ALTERNATIVE APPROACHES TO HUMAN SETTLEMENT

AD's contribution to the UN Conference on Human Settlements (Vancouver, May/June 1976) focuses on alternative methods of providing for human settlement, with examples from the Third World and Western industrialised countries.
