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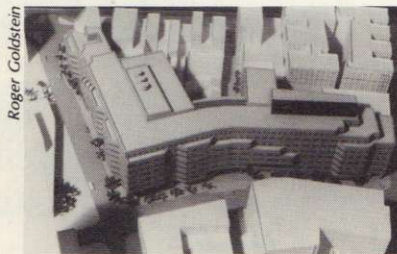

113 Low-rise housing

If the architect-designed, single-family house is, as has been argued, the most personal and most complex building type, then the design of multi-family housing is the most purely difficult, since it contains most of the challenges of the single-family house and adds to them a host of additional complications including larger scale, more elaborate administrative procedures, and (almost always) more severe economic constraints. Most of all, the design of multi-family housing compels the architect to use buildings to make places—not just for individual families and people, but for whole communities—and, doing that, to create for them an image.

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129 Energy-standards project discloses opportunities to maximize conservation

While the prime objective was to give HUD the basis for determining design-budget numbers for the performance standards due late in 1979, AIA Research Corporation's project had three important corollary benefits: 1) it indicated the current level of a/e's expertise in energy-conserving design; 2) it showed that such design can be good architecture; and 3) it expanded the horizons of participating firms.
